Desertion is the abandonment of a military duty or post without permission (a pass, liberty or leave) and is done with the intention of not returning. This contrasts with unauthorized absence (UA) or absence without leave (AWOL / 'eɪwəl /), which are temporary forms of absence.

Criminal desertion is a husband's or wife's abandonment or willful failure without Just Cause to provide for the care, protection, or support of a spouse who is in ill health or necessitous circumstances. Desertion, which is called abandonment in some statutes, is a Divorce ground in a majority of states. Most statutes mandate that the abandonment continue for a certain period of time before a divorce action may be commenced.

Desertion or Abandonment The crime of child desertion or child abandonment occurs when a legally responsible adult leaves a child with the intention to abandon him or her. The parent or guardian must intend to sever the custodial ties over the child, and must often do so without regard for the child's health and safety.

In states like Utah, abandonment occurs when one spouse willfully deserts the family—both physically and financially—for one year or more. Other states have even longer time periods before one spouse's absence can be construed as desertion.

Section 13(1) (ib) of the Hindu Marriage Act, 1955 deals with desertion as a ground for divorce and the explanation of the same reads: "The expression "desertion" means the desertion of the petitioner by the other party to the marriage without reasonable cause and without the consent of or against the wish of such party, and includes the willful neglect of the petitioner by the other party to the marriage, and its grammatical variations and cognate expressions shall be construed ...

In the criminal context, child desertion is defined as physically abandoning a child, but may also include emotional abandonment such as failing to provide basic needs to a child. For example, in some states, a parent may be guilty of abandonment if they fail to provide necessary clothing, food, shelter or medical care for their child.

The burden would no doubt lie on the husband to prove his case of cruelty and desertion by the wife. The judgment in the case of Rajkumar T. s/o Bhaskaran v. Moljimal K.S. d/o K.P. Sasidharan (supra) would also not apply to the facts of the case. The husband has given specific instances of cruelty by the wife.
