The men were told that they were being treated for "Bad Blood" and didn't have any knowledge of being included in a study (CDC).

Sponsored by the U.S. Public Health Service, 399 African American men with syphilis were recruited for a research study on the progression of the disease when left untreated.

While the men volunteered to be treated for "bad blood," they were never informed of the true nature or the risks of the Tuskegee syphilis experiment. For 40 years, public health officials engaged in unethical testing of Black sharecroppers, under the guise of offering them free medical treatment. But the men were never really given treatment.

The true story of the Tuskegee syphilis experiment

The subjects were not told that they had syphilis or that the disease could be transmitted through sexual intercourse. Instead, they were told that they suffered from "bad blood," a local term used to refer to a range of ills. Treatment was initially part of the study, and some patients were administered arsenic, bismuth, and mercury.

An official of the Center for Disease Control (CDC) stated that he understood the term "bad blood" was a synonym for syphilis in the black community. Pollard replied, "That could be true.
