In short, kamiwere considered the suijaku(provisional manifestation or "manifest trace") of buddhas, while buddhas were the honji("original ground") of the kami.

Kami is the Japanese word for a god, deity, divinity, or spirit. It has been used to describe mind (心), God (神), supreme being (神), one of the Shinto deities, an effigy, a principle, and anything that is worshipped.. Although deity is the common interpretation of kami, some Shinto scholars argue that such a translation can cause a misunderstanding of the term.

The term honji suijaku or honchi suijaku in Japanese religious terminology refers to a theory widely accepted until the Meiji period according to which Indian Buddhist deities choose to appear in Japan as native kami to more easily convert and save the Japanese. The theory states that some kami are local manifestations of Buddhist deities. The two entities form an indivisible whole called gongen and in theory should have equal standing, but this was not always the case. In the early Nara period,

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According to this paradigm, it was claimed that Buddhist deities appeared in Japan in the form of kami. In other words, some kami (but not all) were just local manifestations of Buddhist deities. Honji suijaku continued to influence the understanding of divinity and religion in Japan until the modern era.

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Furthermore, buddhas were normally benevolent, whereas the kami were in charge of punishing those who did not respect the deities. However, in medieval Japan a more nuanced vision developed, according to which buddhas and kami together administer punishments against their enemies.

As a general tendency, newer accounts of Shinto history stress that cults of kami deities of diverse origin were integrated in Buddhism already in classical times (notably the 8th century), and that “Shinto,” as an abstract concept denoting a non-Buddhist kami-based religion, developed from Buddhist kami practice only in the later medieval period (the 14th century or 15th century).
