Inversion. (Download this explanation in PDF here.) We use inversion in several different situations in English. Inversion just means putting the verb before the subject. We usually do it in question forms: Normal sentence: You are tired. (The subject is 'you'. It's before the verb 'are'.)

The verb describing the earlier event is usually in the past perfect tense. If hardly, scarcely, barely and no sooner are in the initial position, the subject and auxiliary are inverted: Hardly had I arrived home when my phone rang. (I had hardly arrived home when my phone rang.)
