Struggling readers tend not to ask questions of themselves or the text as they read. Questioning: A reading strategy for kids - The Measured Mom

The ability to routinely generate mental questions while reading, listening, or viewing something not only boosts attention and alertness, but also strengthens comprehension (Duke & Pearson, 2002). When you ask yourself questions about incoming information, you are paying attention, self-monitoring, and actively constructing knowledge.

Deeper Learning through Questioning - LINCS

A good strategy to teach all readers is that instead of just rushing through a passage or chapter, is to pause and generate questions. These can either be questions about what has just happened or what they think might happen in the future. Doing this can help them focus on the main ideas and increase the student's engagement with the material.

Questioning Strategies - CITL

Skimming and scanning are reading strategies that can assist a reader in getting specific information from the text. Students should be taught appropriate times to skim or scan, such as looking for a specific answer, and inappropriate times to use scanning or skimming, such as when reading to comprehend.

Reading Strategies in the Classroom

Learning: ask open and closed questions, and use probing questioning. Relationship building: people generally respond positively if you ask about what they do or enquire about their opinions. If you do this in an affirmative way "Tell me what you like best about working here" you will help to build and maintain an open dialogue.

During guided reading, I may be reading with one student while the other members of the group are reading independently at the table.

Guided Reading Prompts and Questions to Improve ...

Questioning is one of the nine research-based strategies presented in Classroom Instruction That Works (Marzano, Pickering, and Pollock 2001). One important finding is that questions that focus student attention on important elements of a lesson result in better comprehension than those that focus on unusual or interesting elements.

Questions Before, During, and After Reading To encourage critical reading, teachers should ask students questions about the text before, during, and after they read. This method is useful for most subjects, from reading to social studies, and is an excellent way to structure literature homework.

D - DISTANCING QUESTIONS That distance your discussion from the book itself and help your child make connections between the story that you read and his own life. You might ask, "Is there ever a time that you have wanted to use something that wasn't yours?"
